Civilian Response to Active Shooter Events

Law enforcement officers and agencies are frequently requested by schools, businesses and community members for direction and presentations on what they should do if confronted with an active shooter event. The Civilian Response to Active Shooter (CRASE) course, designed and built on the Avoid, Deny, Defend (ADD) strategy developed by ALERRT in 2004, provides strategies, guidance and a proven plan for surviving an active shooter event. Topics include the history and prevalence of active shooter events, civilian response options, medical issues and considerations for conducting drills.

At the end of this training participants will be able to:

- Understand the Avoid-Deny-Defend model of active shooter response.
- Understand the nature of an active shooter/active aggressor event.
- Understand the basic human (physiological) response to disaster in order to properly respond to many critical incidents with self-preservation as the goal.
- Understand what to expect when law enforcement officers arrive on scene at a critical incident like an active shooter/active aggressor.
